

CREATING LEADERS:

Providing education and support to underprivileged children in Timor-Leste

Creating Leaders is an Order of Malta scholarship program in Timor-Leste. The Scholarships support underprivileged children to participate in formal continuing education.

Creating Leaders aims to assist children in the program, develop to their full potential and prepare them for taking a fundamental role in the leadership of their country, so that they become positive agents of change and progress.

Like many developing countries, Timor-Leste has high levels of poverty and low national human development. Education is an important vehicle to employment, independence, social and political empowerment and consequently, national development. However, a cycle of poverty often creates barriers to the children's participation in education. The Creating Leaders scholarship provides not only the payment of school fees, but other assistance and support to help overcome these barriers

An example of a participation barrier can be transport to school. Walking kilometres to school, barefoot and in 35 degree heat can impact the children's performance and attendance. The scholarship provides the

children with their uniforms (including shoes) and transportation to and from school to remove this barrier.

Adequate food is another major cause for poor scholar performance. Children can be faced with a choice between finding work to pay for food or attending school. The scholarship therefore also covers the costs of school meals, where those costs are not met by the State.

- ⊁ The children awarded a scholarship are taught that it comes with a responsibility of "service to those they can help" according to the fundamental ethos of the Order of Malta.
- * The children will be encouraged to enhance the **sense of** belonging to the family of the Order of Malta, through regular interaction with the members of the Order and other children who have been awarded Scholarships.
- 🏃 The children will be provided, through the organization of leisure time and extra-curricular activities, with opportunities for developing and caring the value of human brotherhood.
- ★ The children will be assisted and supported in the process of strengthen their self-esteem and confidence, in the awareness of the diverse talents they have been endowed by God.

VOLUNTEER BBQS CONTINUE AT TIERNEY HOUSE

Since 2006 volunteers have undertaken BBQs at Gorman House three times a week, to provide camaraderie and support to the residents. With Gorman House's temporary closure during its refurbishment and transition to a medical detoxification unit, BBQs during this period have moved to Tierney House.

Tierney House is part of St Vincent's Homeless Health Service and is a 12 bedded residential unit assisting the inner city homeless population to access health care. Tierney House provides a safe and stable environment whereby residents can access assessment, treatment and support from St Vincent's Hospital and local health and support services.

Gorman House is expected to re-open by the end of the year where the Order's BBQs will resume. However following the success and popularity of the BBQs at Tierney House, the NSW Branch is also hoping to continue the service there. The Branch would like to hear from volunteers who would be interested in participating in these BBQs

The garden also houses farm animals. Recently a second garder was established in the suburb of Richmond.

The SA Branch's annual film afternoon has been the main source of funds to support the Adelaide Gaol garden.

The garden is officially named the Dame Roma Mitchell Garden. Dame Roma was a great friend of the Sisters of Mercy in Adelaide, a former Governor of SA, Australia's first woman Supreme Court Judge and was honoured by the Order of Malta in 1997.

IRAQ: LARGE NUMBERS OF REFUGEES INDICATE IMMINENT ATTACK

"Our colleagues have observed increased refugee movement in the Mosul area. This indicates an imminent offensive to free the city of Mosul." says Sid Peruvemba, Programme Director of Malteser International. In order to help people, Malteser International is increasing medical emergency relief for refugees in Makhmur.

Since the Iraqi government began an offensive against ISIS to free the occupied city of Mosul and some of the surrounding villages have already been retaken, around 35,000 more people from this area have arrived in the independent region Kurdistan.

"Many of the internally displaced persons from ISIS-occupied areas have not been able to visit a doctor in years. Drinking water is contaminated, children have not been vaccinated and the hygiene conditions are disastrous. Above all, they lack clean drinking water and basic medical care." says Lisa Hilleke, who works for Malteser International in Erbil in the independent region Kurdistan in north Iraq.

The old camp and the newly constructed additional accommodation for refugees in Dibage in the Makhmur region are severely overcrowded. "At one station around 10,000 people are sharing a space that was originally intended for 6,000 people. The situation is extremely difficult, even now, before the actual military offensive to liberate the city of Mosul has even begun." says Hilleke. The Makhmur region, around 70 km from Erbil, is a first port of call for refugees from the Mosul region.

In order to improve the health of the refugees, Malteser International will first send a mobile clinic to the Makhmur area. Medical personnel will tend to acute, chronic, and in some cases long untreated, diseases and educate the public about contagious diseases.

If fighting increases, the Kurdish government is estimating that up to 500,000 more

refugees will flee to the north of Iraq in a short space of time. This is why Malteser International is planning to further deploy two mobile teams and ambulances in order to take on the first aid of refugees at the border to Kurdistan.

In Iraq, approximately 3.4 million people have now fled from their homes. More than half of them are living as refugees in the independent region Kurdistan. Here, the population has almost doubled in the last two years. The healthcare system in particular is completely overburdened.

Together with partners, Malteser International has been providing relief for refugees in camps in the regions of Erbil and Dohuk since August 2014.

Who are Malteser International?

Malteser International are the worldwide humanitarian relief agency of the Sovereign Order of Malta. Their mandate is to provide relief and recovery during and following conflicts and disasters. They are primarily active in the field of health, in which they have almost 60 years of continuous experience.

Christian values and humanitarian principles form the foundations of their work: bringing aid to people regardless of their religion, background, or political convictions through over 100 Projects in more than 20 countries.

Malteser International provide emergency relief in crises such as natural disasters, epidemics, or armed conflicts. During acute crises, teams from Malteser International are on the ground as soon as possible to provide emergency medical care, and ensure the supply of food and other essential aid materials as needed. From the very beginning, the rebuilding and recovery of the affected area is one of our essential considerations. Wherever possible, we also provide transitional aid and assistance to reduce the risk of future disasters - remaining present long-term at the scene of more protracted crises.

In 2015 Malteser International:

- Provided 230,000 with food, water, clothes and/or emergency shelter
- Medical Facilities around the world treated 970,000 patients
- 160,000 patients were given malaria treatment or prophylaxis

COMMUNITY CARE VAN SERVICE SET TO EXPAND



In June 2015, the NSW Branch initiated a new activity to assist Sydney's homeless - The Community Care Van. The Van is driven by NSW Branch volunteers who also distribute seasonal items to those sleeping rough and a nurse from St Vincent's hospital, offers healthcare.

In the 18 months since the project started the response has been overwhelming and thanks to the generosity of donors, the items distributed by the volunteers have expanded beyond our Coats for the Homeless, to also include sunscreen and sun hats in Summer and water and hygiene packs year round.

Community Care Van Distribution volumes in the last 12 months:

- * 1,677 bottles of water
- ★ 507 Hygiene packs (since March 16)
- **★** 432 Coats for the Homeless
- **★** 361 Sunhats
- ★ 322 tubes of Sunscreen

Currently the Community Care Van service operates once a week, however thanks to the generous support of CITI CLSA, the van will soon be operating twice a week to service the homeless in the state.

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY CONFERENCE 'VARIETIES OF DIVERSITY'

The NSW Branch of the Order of Malta was a sponsor of the Religious Liberty Conference at the University of Notre Dame Australia's School of Law, in conjunction with its Annual Liberty Lecture held in August.

The Religious Liberty Conference examined the varieties of diversity — a mantra of the contemporary age often honoured more in the breach than the observance — and its impact on religion.

The Conference seeks to clarify the ways in which genuine diversity is under threat in the modern world in a way that will resonate with those concerned about civil liberties; whether or not they are themselves religious.

The conference featured highly regarded speakers and panelists from the academic world, the legal profession and religious life.

This year's lecture was presented by lain Benson, Professor of Law at Notre Dame. Iain has also been appointed as an Extraordinary Professor of Law at the University of the Orange Free State in South Africa in recognition of his status as an international constitutional and human rights lawyer, and as a religious liberty expert.

EARTHQUAKE
AFTERMATH IN
CENTRAL ITALY.
Order of Malta's Relief
Corps on the frontline of
rescue operations

Seventy volunteers from the Order of Malta's Italian Relief Corps are currently deployed on a daily basis in the areas affected by the violent earthquake that struck central Italy at 3.36 am on 24 August, and that has left 293 dead and more than 2,000 homeless.

The Order of Malta's volunteers are providing support – by providing first aid, offering psychological assistance and distributing basic needs – to the many affected by the devastating quake. The team includes rescuers, doctors – 2 of whom are on duty for helicopter rescue – nurses and psychologists. The Order of Malta volunteers are in charge of the Sports Stadium in Amatrice, where up to 150 people whose houses were destroyed in the earthquake can take shelter. The Sports Stadium is also where a great amount of aid supplies are stored.

Distribution of medicines and health assistance is also offered to the population living in the isolated surrounding communities.

Unit of the Order of Malta's Italian Relief Corps arrived early on Wednesday morning, just a few hours after the quake, in the area affected. In cooperation with the Italian Civil Protection, it immediately assessed areas suitable for tent cities. At the same time, the medical team worked late into the night in an emergency first aid post set up in the sports field where various medevac (medical evacuation) transportations to hospitals outside the region were carried out by helicopter. A canine unit was also deployed by the Italian Relief Corps soon after the quake in the Amatrice centre- now razed to the ground- in order to rescue more people.

The Assessment and Quick Reaction

Volunteers of the Order of Malta are also assisting the population in Norcia, Umbria, affected by the earthquake.
